The Word of God exposes the heart.

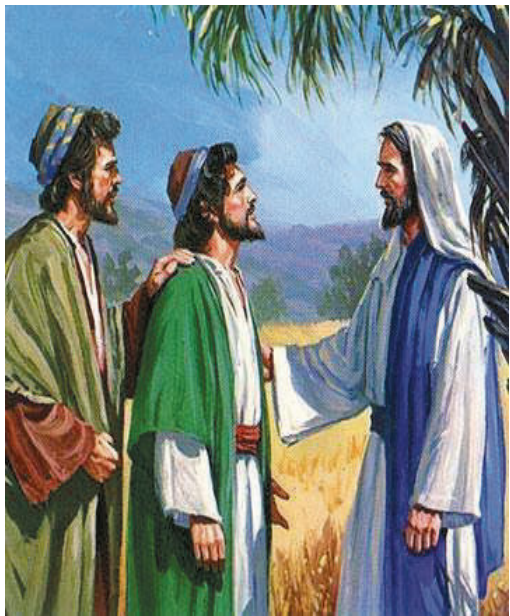
Gospel Reading *Mark 10:17-30 (shorter form Mark 10:17-27)*

A man with many possessions asks Jesus what he must do to gain eternal life.

In our Collect (Opening Prayer) we pray: *“May your grace, O Lord, at all times go before us and follow after and make us all determined to carry out good works.”* we pray this so that we will be open to all the possibilities God has in store for us. Unlike the would-be disciple in the Gospel, who at first was determined to follow Jesus but could not leave the past behind, we need to embrace the future to which Jesus invites us. Mark tells us that, *“Jesus looking at him, loved him.”* Jesus looks at us with love today and hopefully we will respond to that love with faithful witness. The first reading from the Book of Wisdom presents

rightly-ordered priorities. More valuable than power or riches, more lasting than health or beauty is God’s wisdom. For us this means wisdom to understand, as the man who comes to Jesus does not, that following Jesus is the greatest treasure of all. May God’s Word described in the Letter to the Hebrews as sharper than any two-edged sword, pierce our hearts with its living, life-changing truth. We pray that the words of Jesus to his disciples will inspire us and give us the hope we need: *“All things are possible for God”*.

TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY



First Reading *Isaiah 53:10-11*

Through his suffering, the servant of Yahweh will justify many.

Responsorial Psalm *Psalms 33:45,18-19,20,22*

A prayer of praise for God’s mercy

Second Reading *Hebrews 4:14-16*

Jesus is the high priest who sympathizes with our weakness.

Gospel Reading *Mark 10:35-45 (shorter form Mark 10:42-45)*

Jesus teaches that those who wish to be great must be the servant of all.

On this World Mission Sunday, we focus on our baptismal call to share Jesus’ own mission as God’s Servant. The Letter to the Hebrews proclaims: *“Jesus is our great High Priest”*. Yet, he laid down his life for our salvation, drinking the cup of suffering in his passion and cross. As we celebrate this Eucharist we are called to remember to deepen our believe in Jesus’ death and resurrection and our resolve to embrace his mission as Jesus came: *“not to be served but to serve and to give his life as ransom for many”*. Like the suffering servant of the Prophet Isaiah who has *“borne our infirmities and carried our sufferings”*. For us this servant is Jesus, bearer of our sins. We have to realize that true greatness consists in imitating Jesus’ humble service of others. Since he is our merciful high priest, tested in every way we are and thus able to sympathize with our weakness. This is what it means to be first for Jesus, as he speaks in the Gospel of *“the cup that I drink”* and *“the baptism which I am baptized”*. Following this way of life then we will sit one at his right and left when we come into his glory because we too serve others as we live out our faith.

THE NORTH AMERICAN MARTYRS: “*The blood of martyrs is the seed of Christians*”

This maxim, credited to the second-century ecclesiastical writer Tertullian, was profoundly evidenced by eight Jesuit missionaries who brought Jesus to the Indians of North America during the 17th century. In the face of extreme suffering and hardship, these brave Frenchmen met violent deaths while serving God and the Church in remote areas of eastern Canada and New York State. They became known as the North American Martyrs.



There were six priests and two oblate laymen, Jesuits all, who the Church raised to Sainthood as a result of their heroic missionary efforts between the years 1625 and 1649. In an eight-year period (1642-1649), they were all martyred while spreading the Gospel to the North American Indians and as a group were canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1930. Their feast day is October 19th.

Although each of these missionaries had heard about the severe environment of the area called New France, none could fathom what the situation was actually like: disease, severe weather, lack of food, unsanitary living conditions, impassable forests, solitude and a hostile population. Travel was by canoe on treacherous waterways or walking for miles through dense insect-filled and uncharted forests. The Jesuit mission was to witness to a population of Indians who spoke a different language, were violent enemies and were not opposed to the use of torture.

The martyrs are Saints Rene Goupil (1642). Isaac Jogues (1646), Jean de Lalande (1646), Antoine Daniel (1648), Jean de Brebeuf (1649), Noel Chabanel (1649), Charles Garnier (1649) and Gabriel Lalemant (1649)

World Mission Sunday

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 20TH: WORLD MISSION SUNDAY

“A EUCHARISTIC CELEBRATION FOR ALL THE MISSIONS OF THE WORLD”

It exists to help us nurture a missionary spirit while encouraging our prayerful and financial support of the Church’s missionary work. It celebrates our unity as a human family and provides an opportunity to support the life-giving presence of local Priests, Religious and Lay Catechists among the suffering and poor of the Missions. This collection is sponsored by the Propagation of the Faith. We support it by prayer and sacrifice. Please be generous.

About World Mission Sunday In 1926, Pope Pius XI established an annual collection for the missionary work of the Church worldwide called “World Mission Sunday”. World Mission Sunday, organized by the Society of the Propagation of the Faith, is a day set aside for Catholics worldwide to recommit themselves to the Church’s missionary activity through prayer and sacrifice. As described by St. Pope John Paul II, WMS is “an important

day in the life of the Church because it teaches how to give: as an offering made to God, in the Eucharistic celebration and for all the missions of the world” (Redemptoris Missio 81).

The Propagation of the Faith is entrusted with the promotion of World Mission Sunday, collection of the proceeds and distribution. The Mission Office sends the proceeds to the National Office, which sends the monies to the international office of the Society of the Propagation of the Faith in Rome. At their annual meeting in Rome, The International Society for the Propagation of the Faith decides how the funds collected will be distributed to missionaries worldwide, based on needs that are prioritized .

On World Mission Sunday, Catholics of the world unite at Mass to recommit ourselves to our vocation, through Baptism, to be missionaries. The Church’s missionary activity begins with the proclamation of faith: “*Jesus is Lord!*” Jesus is our common hope, a hope that saves. On WMS, we are called in a special way to be “missionaries of faith” through prayer and participation in the Eucharist.

In a world where so much divides us, WMS rejoices in our unity as missionaries! And it provides an opportunity to support the life-giving presence of the Church among the suffering and the poor. It is a wonderful opportunity to remind and encourage the faithful of the Baptism by which we are all called to participate in the mission of the Church and share our faith with others; to animate and support the more than 1,150 mission dioceses in Africa, Asia, the Pacific Islands and remote regions of Latin America.

Our Holy Father. Pope Francis, says, " being a missionary is not about proselytizing or mere strategy; mission is part of the “grammar” of faith, something essential for those who listen to the voice of the Spirit who whispers “Come” and “Go forth”."
